What is Operation Encompass?

Operation Encompass is a partnership between police and schools. Operations Encompass' aim is that all incidents of domestic abuse are shared with schools, not just those where an offence can be identified. Operation Encompass works as a partnership between the police and schools, notifying schools before the day begins if police have attended an incident of domestic abuse at an address where a child is registered as living. Since 2025, it has become a statutory duty for Police to report incidents of Domestic Violence to Schools.

Every school appoints a trained Key Adult (at MBS these adults are, Hannah Pallôt, Matt Collinge and Sam Shainberg) The Key Adult is the person who receives information about police attended Domestic Abuse incidents.

This timely information sharing enables appropriate support to be provided for that child so that all interactions, from when the child first arrives at the school gates, are of a positive nature.

Children are negatively impacted by experiencing domestic abuse and without early intervention and support this negative impact can last through a child's life course. Domestic abuse can impact upon social, psychological, physical, emotional and behavioural outcomes with an often-negative impact upon a child's academic success. Since 2021, children who witness or live in a home where domestic abuse takes place have been recognised as victims of abuse. Experiencing domestic abuse has been identified as an Adverse Childhood Experience. Operation Encompass aims, by directly connecting police and schools, to secure better outcomes for children, to enable schools to better understand the impact living with domestic abuse has upon children, to help schools to better understand a child's lived experience and to therefore be able to support and nurture each child, making a child's day better and giving them a better tomorrow.

Why and when was Operation Encompass created?

Operation Encompass was the brainchild of husband and wife Elisabeth and David Carney-Haworth OBEs. Elisabeth was the Headteacher at Torpoint Nursery and Infant school. [This short video](#) [<2-minute watch] explains how the experience of one child instigated the creation of Operation Encompass.

What are the Key Principles for the Police in relation to Operation Encompass?

- All police attended Domestic Violence and abuse incidents are shared with a school's trained Key Adult.
- Information should be passed to schools about all school aged children; this can mean 2 to 18 years of age.
- This information is shared with the schools prior to the start of the next school day (before 8:30am).
- DV incidents from Friday through the weekend should be shared with the Key Adult on a Monday morning.
- DV incidents during school holidays should also be shared.
- Incidents of child to parent abuse should be shared.
- Incidents of teenage relationship abuse should be shared.
- As all forces in England and Wales are now part of Operation Encompass cross border incidents should be passed wherever possible.
